## **Big Lottery Fund - BASIS 2**

Funding for voluntary and community sector **infrastructure** organisations

**Opened for applications:** 7 May 2008

**Application closing date:** 27 August 2008

**Minimum grant:** £10,001 ; **Maximum grant:** £500,000 for projects within one region.

The BASIS programme aims to ensure that voluntary and community organisations throughout England have access to high quality support that will help them be more effective. In round one the Lottery Funded BASIS programme awarded £101 million to 206 voluntary and community sector infrastructure organisations across England. They expect to award up to £50 million in round two.

The BASIS programme defines infrastructure organisations as those which provide information, advice, training and other support that helps voluntary and community groups do their work better, as well as help with networking or partnerships and advocacy or campaigning.

**Important note:** Before downloading BASIS programme guidance notes make sure you look in detail at the BASIS programme **priorities for the London region** to find out whether your project falls within their current criteria. Download the **London region priorities leaflet** here:

## **Big Lottery Fund - Reaching Communities**

This fund is aimed at projects that respond to needs identified by communities and which actively involve them. Projects of interest are those which help hard to reach groups and those most in need.

The three-year programme was launched on 7 December 2005 and will make up to £60 million available in 2008-09.

**Reaching Communities will give grants of £10,000+ and up to £500,000, including a maximum of £50,000 for capital grants. Projects can be funded for up to five years.**

You can apply to Reaching Communities if you are; a registered charity, voluntary or community group, statutory body, (including schools), charitable or not-for-profit company or a social enterprise - (a business that chiefly run for social objectives, whose profits are reinvested in the business).

**As yet there is no firm closing date for applications - however it will be later this year.**

**Important note:** Reaching Communities has proven to be very popular and highly competitive. Any new applicant should note the high levels of interest in this programme and consider whether your project is not better suited to another Big Lottery Fund programme. Currently 24% of applications are successful. You are advised to check the Big Lottery website to view the latest news and current success rates for applicants to Reaching Communities.

<b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>The Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Fund's Grants for Community Organisations Working With Children and Young People Seeking Asylum</u></b></p> <p>This criteria-led grants round is aimed at community led organisations providing direct services to or advocating on behalf of children and young people under the age of 21 who are refugees or seeking asylum in the UK. The Refugee and Asylum Seekers Initiative's core focus is to change policy to meet international standards on children's rights. The Initiative is aware that local advocacy is crucial for raising awareness and influencing policy makers to take action. Therefore, it is intended that the grants round will enable community led groups to be better equipped to fulfil this important advocacy role.</p> <p><b>Objective</b> - to provide support to community organisations providing direct services and advocating on behalf of children and young people seeking asylum in the following areas:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Detention</li> <li>• Destitution</li> <li>• Enabling access to services such as: healthcare, legal provision, housing, and education</li> <li>• Providing support to unaccompanied children</li> </ul> <p><b>The minimum amount that can be applied for is £3,000.</b>  <b>The Fund anticipates that the majority of grants awarded will be in the region of £50,000.</b></p> <p>The current grants round opened on 4<sup>th</sup> July 2008  <b>Deadline for applications:</b> 5:00pm - 12th September 2008</p>

<b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>Thames Community Foundation - Grassroots Grants Programme</u></b></p> <p><b>Grant size: up to £5000</b></p> <p>The <i>Grassroots Grants</i> programme, funded by the Office of the Third Sector, is a key element of the Government's strategy to build stronger and more active communities by increasing small grant funding to community groups and making them more sustainable. <b>Grassroots Grants will support small informal voluntary and community groups many of whom depend on volunteers.</b> To apply for this funding your group must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Be a small not-for-profit, third sector voluntary or community group, active in their local community for not less than twelve months before the date of your application.</li> <li>• Be based in and providing services to residents and communities in a <i>Grassroots Grants</i> Fund area - currently listed on the TCF website as: <b>Hammersmith and Fulham Grassroots Grants, Hounslow Grassroots Grants, Kingston Grassroots Grants, Merton Grassroots Grants, Richmond Grassroots Grants, Sutton Grassroots Grants, Wandsworth Grassroots Grants.</b> (Please note - if your borough is not listed here it is still worth contacting TCF directly since the list on their website is not fully up to date.)</li> <li>• Have an income, as shown in the group's accounts, of less than £20,000 per year taken as an average over the last three years (or over the life of the group if it is less than three years old).</li> <li>• Be volunteer-led</li> <li>• Be connected with and/or meeting the needs of the local community</li> <li>• Have a governing document (constitution or a set of rules)</li> </ul> <p><b>You do not have to be a registered charity to apply for Grassroots funding.</b></p> <p><b>Application rounds</b> - are frequent (typically monthly) contact TCF directly for more details. <b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>Deutsche Bank Employee Fund for Education and Social Investment - Small grants fund</u></b>  Deutsche Bank Employee Fund for Education and Social Investment in London 2008 is a fund supported by Deutsche Bank staff and matched by the Deutsche Bank Franchise Matched Giving Scheme.</p> <p>If you are a local voluntary or community group and you need funding for a project focusing on Education or Community Development, this grant fund may be able to help. Applications are invited for projects in any London borough which focus on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Education</b> - Retention projects - easing the transition between primary and secondary schools, reducing absenteeism, preventing exclusion. Achievement projects - raising people's aspirations, achievements and attainment levels, for example in financial literacy, business awareness, functional and soft skills. Progression projects - educating, encouraging, and prepare for progression into further education/training/employment.</li> <li>• <b>Community Development</b> - Community Sport projects that build skills and achievements, improve community cohesion and participation and reduce crime / social exclusion. Educational Outreach projects - working with people not in education, employment or training. Employment &amp; Employability - supporting the development of both business and social entrepreneurs - working with those furthest from the labour market to help them find appropriate and sustainable employment. Homelessness - addressing the causes of homelessness and helping the homeless to reintegrate back into society.</li> </ul> <p><b>The maximum grant is £5,000. However you are strongly advised to make applications around £3,000 as few maximum grants will be awarded due to the size of the fund.</b> Please note that the amount you apply for must be no more than 30% of your total annual income. For example, if your annual income or expected income for the coming year is £12,000, you should make an application for £3,600 or less.</p> <p><b>Priority will be given to projects with match funding and good prospects for sustainability.</b>  <b>Application deadline:</b> 31st January 2009. Decisions are made quarterly.</p>

<b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>Tudor Trust</u></b>  The Tudor Trust is a charitable trust interested in funding under-resourced organisations which offer direct services and which involve the people they work with in their planning. <b>You do not have to be a registered charity to apply for a grant, as long as your group or project has established charitable objectives.</b> Grants can take the form of core funding (including salaries and running costs), development funding, project grants or capital grants for buildings or equipment. There is no maximum or minimum grant amount. Grants are usually made over one, two or three years but the Trust may work alongside organisations for a longer period. The Trust will consider funding:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Organisations which are embedded in and have developed out of their community whether the local area or a 'community of interest'</li> <li>• Organisations providing direct services to marginalised people</li> <li>• Organisations which focus on building stronger communities by overcoming isolation and fragmentation and encouraging inclusion, connection and integration</li> </ul> <p><b>Whilst there is no notional minimum or maximum grant for which you may apply, the lowest sum recently granted was £5000.</b></p>

The plan sets out the governments aim to reduce the rate of young people entering the Criminal Justice system by one fifth by 2020. <p style="text-align: center;"><b>Information</b></p>	<p><b><u>Engaging Communities in Fighting Crime - new report by Louise Casey, former head of the Government's Respect Task Force</u></b>          Louise Casey has published a major new review examining how to better engage communities in the fight against crime and raise public confidence in the Criminal Justice System.</p> <p><b>The report examines five broad areas:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Putting victims, witnesses and other law-abiding citizens first;</li> <li>2. fighting crime and delivering justice for communities;</li> <li>3. a new approach to crime statistics;</li> <li>4. the citizen's role in tackling crime; and</li> <li>5. freedoms and accountability.</li> </ol> <p>In particular CSAS members will be interested in proposals 26-28. <b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>Street Weapons Commission</u></b></p> <p>The Street Weapons Commission formed as an independent and diverse group of commissioners chaired by Cherie Booth. They were tasked with examining the problem of gun and knife crime on Britain's streets and with attempting to find out why so many young people now routinely carry guns and knives. In May this year, the Commission took evidence from interested parties at a series of hearings held in cities across Britain. Their findings have been published in a final report. CCM's mission is: save lives, make the peace and assist in keeping the peace.</p> <p>CCM has worked in partnership with Safer London Foundation and a range of Community Safety Partnerships across South East London, to bring the project to its current status. CCM now seeks expressions of interest from persons who would like to be trained to act as associates of the company, to undertake conflict management between individuals and across peer groups. This work will be at the higher level of risk and you will be required to engage persons or groups, many of whom possess the potential to engage in violence. Your training will be to the highest level, undertaken by a team previously working in this area for 4 years.</p>
