<b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>Positive Destinations</u></b></p> <p>BBC Children in Need and The Hunter Foundation have announced a UK-wide £2 million grants programme. Funding will be awarded to innovative and effective projects that have the potential to deliver positive outcomes to some of the most vulnerable children and young people in the UK. The programme will take place over three years and is aiming to award three large grants of around £500,000 each and three smaller grants which will have the remaining £500,000 divided between them.</p> <p>Positive Destinations aims to deliver sustainable support to these young people to ensure that they achieve a positive future in terms of education, employment or training. The funders will seek projects that target either key points in determining a young person's future (i.e. pre-school, transition from primary to secondary education and the 14 - 16 year period prior to work or further education) or an holistic approach to this problem.</p> <p>Projects will be expected to generate learning and ensure the sustainability of their work beyond the life of Positive Destinations funding. Active research will enable the projects to adapt as they go to maximise impacts. The deadline for applications is <b>30 March 2008</b>.</p> <p>NB: This programme is additional to BBC Children in Need's normal grants programme.</p>

<b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>Mustard Seed Programme</u></b></p> <p>This small grants fund is part of the Church Urban Fund and aimed at churches and faith based organisations. Its aim is to help them engage in social action through supporting them initiate, develop and formulate ideas and opportunities in preparation for undertaking larger pieces of work.</p> <p>Funding of up to £5,000 is available for a period of 12 months for specific activities but not for on-going expenditure. The application process has been simplified to encourage new groups that have new ideas they really want to test and try out. The Church Urban Fund also offers a main grants programme which offers funding of between £5,000 and £30,000 which will fund capital and revenue costs. Again, this grant is intended to be a first-funder.</p>

<b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>The Trusthouse Charitable Foundation</u></b></p> <p>The Foundation currently makes over 300 grants a year of which the majority are small grants (averaging £5,000). A small number of larger grants (i.e. over £10,000) are awarded each year.</p> <p>The Foundation offers grants under two separate programmes:</p> <p><b><u>The Small Grant Programme (capital and revenue grants)</u></b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• offers grants <b>under £10,000 only</b> to organisations with annual incomes below £300,000 p.a.;</li> <li>• grants are for one-off purposes within the priorities set out above and must be spent within six months of receipt;</li> <li>• grants can be for one-off capital items, such as equipment or small capital works, or towards six months running costs;</li> <li>• for requests of under £5,000, there is a programme to “fast track” the appeals so that applicants will know the outcome within six to eight weeks of receipt of the application;</li> <li>• applicants should complete <a href="#">form A</a> to apply for a small grant.</li> </ul> <p><b><u>The Large Grant Programme (capital grants only)</u></b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• is available to all organisations of any size;</li> <li>• offers grants of normally between £10,000 and £30,000 for <b>capital projects only (i.e. equipment, building or capital works)</b>;</li> <li>• capital grants will not normally be offered to very large capital projects (e.g. over £1m), but individual and discrete elements of very large projects may be considered when a significant proportion of the total appeal has already been raised;</li> <li>• applicants should complete <a href="#">form B</a> to apply for a large grant.</li> </ul> <p>Demand for larger grants is high:- at present only one in ten applications is successful so please consider applying for a small grant if your annual income is below £300,000 as you may stand more chance of success.</p>

<b>Information</b>	<p><b><u>Funding for Community Development and Education Projects (London)</u></b></p> <p>Deutsche Bank and Capital Community Foundation have announced a new small grants fund for 2008. Applications are welcomed from local groups focusing on Education or Community Development in: <b>Camden, Lewisham, and Westminster.</b></p> <p>The maximum level of funding available is £5000. However, Deutsche Bank expect most grants to be below £3000. Eligible applicants include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Community groups</li> <li>• Voluntary organisations</li> <li>• Charities</li> <li>• Community Interest companies</li> <li>• Social enterprises.</li> </ul> <p>Although there is no income threshold, organisations with an income of less than £100,000 per year will be given priority.</p> <p>The closing date for applications is <b>2 May 2008.</b></p>

Information	<p><b><u>Trust For London</u> - Supporting London's Communities</b></p> <p>Trust For London is set up to fund small voluntary charitable organisations in London, working closely with its sister fund <b>City Parochial Foundation (shown below)</b>, which supports organisations tackling poverty in London. It has separate funding guidelines. <b>Check carefully which fund is more appropriate to your organisation as you can only apply to <u>one</u>.</b></p> <p>Under the existing guidelines funding is up to a maximum of £15,000 per year for up to three years to organisations made up of volunteers or members with paid staff of no more than 35 hours per week. The average grant is £8,000.</p> <p>Grants for the Trust's open programme funds work which has one or more of the following aims:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• To challenge discrimination faced by disabled people</li> <li>• To promote the inclusion and integration of recently established communities</li> <li>• To strengthen mother-tongue and supplementary schools to provide creative educational opportunities</li> <li>• To address new and emerging needs</li> </ul> <p>Closing Dates: <b>30 May</b> for the October Grants Cttee and <b>25 October</b> for the February Grants Cttee.</p>

Information	<p><b><u>City Parochial Foundation</u> - Tackling Poverty in London</b></p> <p>City Parochial Foundation (the sister fund of Trust for London) helps to deal with deprivation, unemployment, inequality, homelessness, poor health and pollution. It aims to enable and empower the poor of London to tackle poverty and its root causes. <b>Check carefully which fund is more appropriate to your organisation as you can only apply to <u>one</u>.</b></p> <p>The Foundation's open programme has four priority areas:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• To improve employment opportunities for disadvantaged people</li> <li>• To promote the inclusion of recent arrivals in the UK</li> <li>• To promote social justice</li> <li>• To strengthen the voluntary and community sector</li> </ul> <p>Some funding is allocated to exceptional work to tackle poverty which falls outside the open programme and you should speak to one of the Foundation's officers if you wish to apply.</p> <p>Average grants are £45,000 in total, with some smaller (£5,000 to £30,000) and a few larger (over £70,000).</p> <p>In addition to the open programme, they also fund <b>special initiatives</b>. These areas are publicised on the website as they develop. Occasionally, <b>research</b> is funded. Information	<p><b><u>The Pilgrim Trust</u></b></p> <p>The Trust allocates funds in three areas: preservation, places of worship, and social welfare. 40% of funding is allocated to social welfare.</p> <p>The purpose of the application must be charitable. Normally applications will <b>only</b> be considered from United Kingdom registered charities except where the applicant is exempt from registration, is a recognised public body or is registered as a Friendly Society. No grants can be made to private individuals. The project must be based within the United Kingdom.</p> <p>Trustees run a small grants fund and have set aside 10% of their annual grant giving budget from each of the priority areas for applications of £5,000 or less. These applications normally require less detailed assessment, whereas a site visit or meeting may be required for larger applications. Applicants for sums of less than £5,000 should include the names of two referees from organisations with whom they work.</p> <p>The full board of Trustees meets quarterly and you can make an application at any time during the year. Applications will normally be placed before Trustees at the next quarterly meeting following submission, so long as the application and all the necessary supporting information is received at least eight weeks before the date of that meeting.</p> <p>There are no deadlines and you should send in your application as soon as you are ready to do so.</p>

Information	<p><b><u>The Alcohol Education and Research Council</u></b></p> <p>The main aims of the Council are to increase the capacity of individuals and organisations to deal with alcohol issues and also to develop the evidence base. In addition to its aims of rigorous research projects and development of people and organisations, the Council will fund small projects up to a maximum of £5,000. Small grants could fund small research projects, pilot research studies or demonstration projects with a strong evaluation component. They could also fund projects that increase the capacity of individuals and organisations to deal with alcohol issues. The following criteria are used to judge all applications for small grants including those that are designed to develop people:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Will the project make a difference to the alcohol evidence base or to the capacity of individuals or organisations?</li> <li>• Are the aims well defined and achievable?</li> <li>• Is there a sound evaluation component to check whether aims have been achieved?</li> </ul> <p>The Council will give preference to projects that will have a demonstrable impact. A useful list of current grant holders is on their website.</p> <p><u>Small grants</u> will be rapidly processed throughout the year with no deadline.</p>

Information	<p><b><u>Lankelly Chase Foundation</u></b></p> <p>The Foundation's grants outside the Eastern and South West region of the country will be limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• New approaches in the resettlement of offenders or the support of detained refugees or asylum seekers. These must be able to show that they may be replicable, e.g. through the active involvement of large national charities which intend to promote developments elsewhere.</li> <li>• Projects which are designed to strengthen the voluntary and community sector so that it is more able to meet the needs of black minority ethnic prisoners and their families.</li> <li>• Projects which involve prisoners in the arts, principally dance or drama, with a view to strengthening self-esteem and self-understanding. Final performances must be open to partners and family members.</li> </ul> <p>Projects from the Greater London area may apply, within these parameters.</p>

Information	<p><b><u>Lloyds TSB Foundations</u></b></p> <p>The Lloyds TSB Group has announced that the four Lloyds TSB Foundations across the UK will receive £37.1 million this year to fund the charities supporting disadvantaged people and community groups across the UK. Funding through the Foundation is primarily made through two grant programmes. These are:</p> <p><b>Community Open Programme</b> - open to all charities whose work falls within the Foundation's overall mission statement. To be eligible you must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• enable disadvantaged and/or disabled people to play a fuller role in their communities</li> <li>• have your own charity number, an industrial/provident society number or exempt from charity status</li> <li>• be an underfunded charity - with 12 months of reserves or less</li> <li>• have an income of £1 million or less if you are a local or regional charity</li> <li>• have an income of £5 million or less if you are a national charity working across England and Wales</li> </ul> <p><b>Community Priority Programme</b> - focusing on funding designed to meet local and national needs. Eligibility is the same as the Open Programme. Examples of prioritised projects for London and surrounding areas are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Excluded young people</li> <li>• Refugees, asylum seekers and migrants</li> <li>• Mental health</li> <li>• Prisoners, ex-prisoners and their families</li> <li>• People returning to the community</li> <li>• Diverse minority communities</li> </ul>
